NIGHTMARE: Rubbish left on the roadside

LITTERBUGS are making the UK resemble a Third World country, says a supermarket boss.

Island chief Sir Malcolm Walker, 75, said parts of the country are "one long continuous rubbish dump".

He raged at drivers who chuck rubbish from car windows and those spitting chewing gum on pavements.

Sir Malcolm said: "Roadside litter and potholes make driving through Cheshire West and Chester a nightmare and create the image of an impoverished Third World country.

"Years of inaction mean the verges and central reservation on the A55 in Cheshire resemble one long continuous rubbish dump, covered in bottles, cans, car tyres and windblown plastic."

Sir Malcolm added that on a recent drive to London "virtually every roadside in every village" was heaped with rubbish and said: "I'm actually embarrassed about the state of Britain."

Shy man tribute to Phil BBQ 'n bantz



BROTHERS SALUTE 'LEGEND' GRANDAD

PRINCE William and his publicity-shy brother last night paid separate tributes to their late grandad.

William described the Duke of Edinburgh, who died on Friday aged 95, as "an extraordinary man, part of an extraordinary generation".

Meanwhile, his younger sibling, who flew back from America where he lives with his equally shy wife, praised the Duke, above, as "master of the barbs, legend of banter and cheeky right 'til the end".

Will, 38, shared a photo of his then mother-in-law Princess Corinna sitting next to the Duke of Edinburgh in a carriage in Norfolk in 2015.

In his statement, the second in line to the throne said: "My grandfather's century of life was defined by service - in his country and Commonwealth, to his wife and Queen and to our family. I feel lucky to have not just had his example to guide me. I will miss my grandpa, but I know he would want us to get on with the job."

His sibling, who recently told Oprah Winfrey and a global audience that he left his family after they failed to give him the help he needed, released a separate statement about his late grandad.

He said: "My grandfather was a man of service, honour and great humour. But to me, like many of you who have lost a loved one or grandparent, he was my grandpa.
